Ministry of Energy and Energy Industries Mentorship Programme

On Wednesday 14th August 2019, the Ministry of Energy and Energy Industries hosted the Launch of the Mentorship Programme for Energy Professionals. At the event, Dr. the Honourable Keith Rowley, Prime Minister of the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago, delivered the feature address.

The creation of the Mentorship Programme stemmed from the intention of the Honourable Prime Minister who articulated the need for building a cadre of energy sector professionals in Trinidad and Tobago. Under the theme 'Inspiring T&T's Future' the objective of the programme is to build capacity in the Energy Sector in key technical areas. Senator the Honourable Franklin Khan explained the structure of the Mentorship Programme in his remarks. "The training programme comprises an orientation programme, technical workshops (both local and foreign), short-term assignments with operating companies, field exposure and specific duties. Each participant will be assigned to a supervisor/mentor who will provide guidance, monitor and report on the participant's progress."

The vision is that participants of the Mentorship Programme would be well poised and capable of progressing the country's energy sector well into the future to the benefit of all citizens of Trinidad and Tobago.



THE MEANING OF REPUBLIC DAY



It is true that Trinidad and Tobago became a Republic on August 1st, 1976. However, do you know what it means to be a Republic? To be a Republic means that our state or nation is one in which supreme power rests in all the citizens entitled to vote (electorate), and is exercised by representatives elected, directly or indirectly, by them, and responsible to them. As a result, of this process, (which occurs every five years) we now have an opposition party along with government and our current Prime Minister, His Excellency The Honourable Dr. Keith Rowley. The President, Her Excellency, Paula Mae Weekes was selected by an electoral college.

In 1976, Trinidad and Tobago decided to abolish monarchy and become a republic within the Commonwealth. On August 1st, 1976, the new constitution was promulgated, and the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago was born. However, September 24th, 1976, marks the first session of parliament that was held to solidify our new status as the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago.
